

REPORT

on the Inaugral Fulltime Trainee Chess Program under the Chess Kenya Academy funded by the World Chess Federation (FIDE) under the Planning and Development Commission (PDC)





INTRODUCTION

Chess Kenya will launch the Chess Kenya Academy to provide quality training program. The program will seek to target both junior and senior players who are not only passionate about chess but also have attained a respectable level of performance either locally or internationally.

Chess Kenya will run a full time paid trainee program that aims to produce quality players who will focus purely on chess for a specified time frame. The program aims to ignite the potential of the players and push them to a level where they can individually push themselves towards excellence. The program will be strictly guided by the coach who will oversee their training both physically and online. The trainees will be provided with stipend to cushion them from financial pressures so that they can fully focus on the training.

Advertisement of the program

Chess Kenya sought to recruit passionate, enthusiastic disciplined and motivated members of the federation into the inaugural Chess Kenya Academy to start in May 2019. The ideal candidates were to meet the following requirements:

- a) Must be a paid up member for the year 2019.
- **b)** Must demonstrate desire and passion to achieve excellence in chess sports. Evidence of podium finish in past tournaments will be an added advantage.
- c) Must be patriotic, having a strong devotion to vigorously support Kenya's quest to assert itself in Chess sport.
- d) Must be available on a full time basis starting from May 2019. Those employed, schooling or married are advised not to apply.
- e) Must be willing to work under strict guidance of the coach to achieve the expected targets.
- f) Must be computer literate and conversant with various chess sites and programs.
- **g)** Must be a passport holder or willing to apply for one immediately and ready travel on chess related assignment.
- h) Proposed monthly stipend is USD 350 for trainees and USD 400 for the coach payable in arrears (at the end of each month)
- i) Applicants should submit a resume, cover letter and a brief statement outlining their chess career and why they think they deserve the opportunity.



SELECTION PROCESS

We received overwhelming responses in applications from players interested in taking up the program. This demonstrated the huge interest by members to elevate our country's chess profile to the next level.

We received 23 applicants (15 men and 8 ladies), all expressing their passion to give their best. We had to narrow down to those with international exposure and demonstrated local achievement over the last two years. We also had to make a decision to exclude those in universities, majority of whom were in their second year of study. Education is critical and it wouldn't be advisable to abandon ones studies for this program. Nevertheless, we have records of all the applicants and we will be keenly following their progress for future consideration.



• Training by top trainers - Chess Kenya invited Ugandan IM Arthur Ssegwanyi to offer training, assess progress and give feedback on how the program can be enhanced.

• Invited Trainers Commission Secretary FT Peter Long to asses the program and he made recommendations on how it can be enhanced

• Facilitation to participate in tournaments - they participated in various tournaments including the Mombasa Open, Tanzania Open, Kenya National Chess League and the Kisumu Dala Open.


